



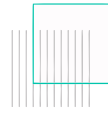

Faradata Social Change and Women Empowerment Organization (FSCWEO) is a local and grassroots organization with a significant operational presence in the southern and western provinces of Afghanistan. We have access to the most hard-to-reach communities in every district and village of these provinces.

FSCWEO has successfully implemented significant projects in Farah, Nimroz, Kandahar, Herat, and Helmand, and reached communities that no other humanitarian organization has ever been able to. Over the years, we have accumulated invaluable experience working with the local communities, developed a solid understanding of the social and cultural norms of the local communities, learned important lessons, and developed strong relationships with the local elders and community leaders. Fairness, integrity, and transparency are values that FSCWEO upholds in regard to donors' money. We strive to achieve the greatest impact with the least possible operational expense. We constantly keep our stakeholders informed of our resource utilization and the impacts of our work. We have a robust internal control system in place, we share our financial records, and are always open to external audits. This entails creating thorough, timely, and accurate financial reports and making them available to interested parties.

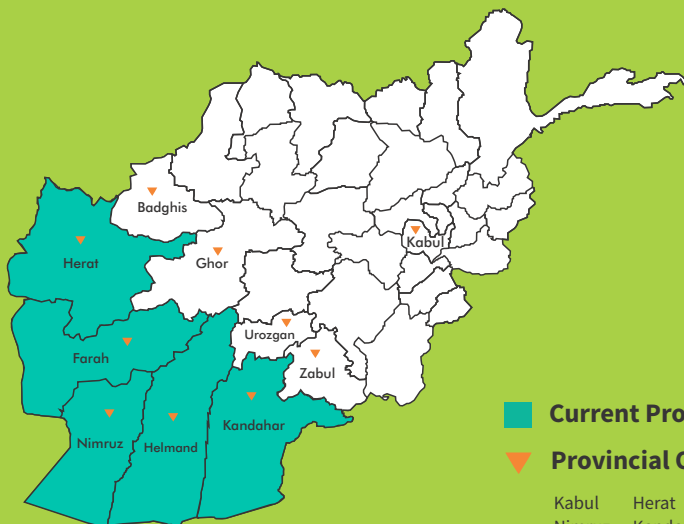

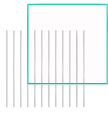

Message from the Director

Western and southern provinces of Afghanistan are among the most vulnerable conflict-affected regions of the country. Unfortunately, some of these areas have not received development dollars and humanitarian aid for the past 20 years, and as a result, the people have suffered from poverty, food insecurity, a lack of access to education, diseases, and unemployment.

FaraData Social Change and Women Empowerment Organization (FSCWEO) was one of the first non-governmental organizations (NGOs) to be established and work in Farah province. It was founded by a group of young professionals who aspired to fulfill their social responsibility to their people and were not frightened of the province's corrupted security situation.

Our staff have bravely and courageously conquered all hurdles and reached every district in Farah and other neighboring provinces over the years. We gave the poor food, winter clothing, blankets, and cash. We constructed greenhouses and provided seeds and supplies to farmers.

We assisted small enterprises in expanding. We pushed for the abolition of child marriage and the empowerment of women.

We were among the first to have women on our executive team in an extremely conservative community.

Following the government shift in 2021, FSCWEO has demonstrated remarkable resiliency. We saw a need to serve communities in western and southern Afghanistan and worked tirelessly to meet that need. We are extremely proud of the impact we had, the contribution we made to reducing the burden of the humanitarian crisis, and we are thankful to the donors who contributed to the fight. We are ready to serve our people and contribute to the battle against hunger and poverty with a strong will and doubled energy.

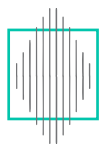

Women Empowerment and Gender Equality

Women Empowerment and Gender Equality is FSCWEO's primary focus. In late 2022 FSCWEO established its Center for Women Empowerment and Gender Equality aiming to deliver capacity-building services for women and girls through different capacity-building approaches including, community mobilization, awareness campaign, volunteerism, legal, and psychosocial counseling and livelihood interventions.

In Nov, 2021, FSCWEO established its Legal Aid and Psychosocial Counseling Centers in Farah and Nimruz provinces in order to provide Legal and Mental health services to the most marginalized girls and women. The primary goal of the centers is to protect women's rights and pave the way for smooth access to justice.

The centers are self-funded initiatives and are specifically working on Family Law, GBV Cases, Psychosocial Counseling, Education and Women's socio-economic development.

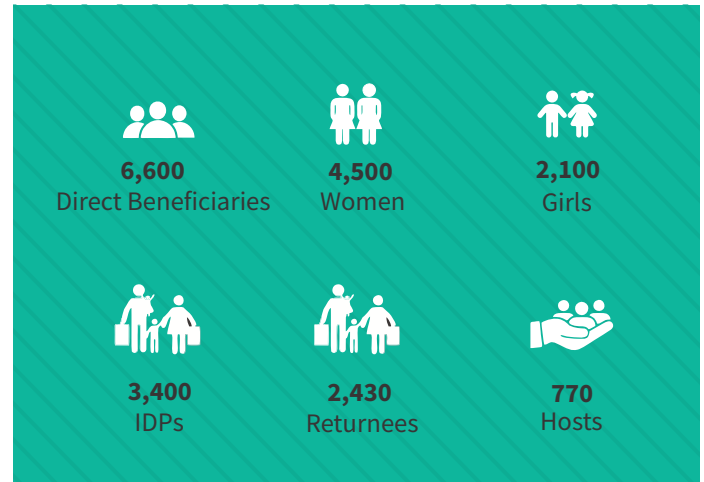
Key Achievements

250 Women have been provided with Legal consulting Services and referred to the DoJ, DoRR, DoWA, and Humanitarian Organizations.

2,500 Individual Psychosocial Counselling sessions, 260 Family Session and 60 Psycho-education sessions have been conducted for 4,100 Women and girls in Farah and Nimruz Provinces.

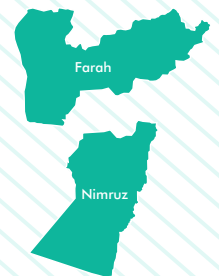
250 girls have been provided with educational counselling in which 25 of them have been introduced to national and international universities through fully funded scholarships to peruse their higher education.

2,000 women, and girls have been trained on Peace, Tolerance and Economic Development through conducting 60 Peace and Economic Community Dialogues in Nimruz Province.



Province Covered

For the last decades, Farah, Ghor, Badghis, Helmand, Zabul and Nimruz provinces have been the frontline of civil war which left thousands of children without parents. These provinces host the most vulnerable, widows, martyrs, disabled, and displaced men and women who live in severe need of humanitarian assistants.



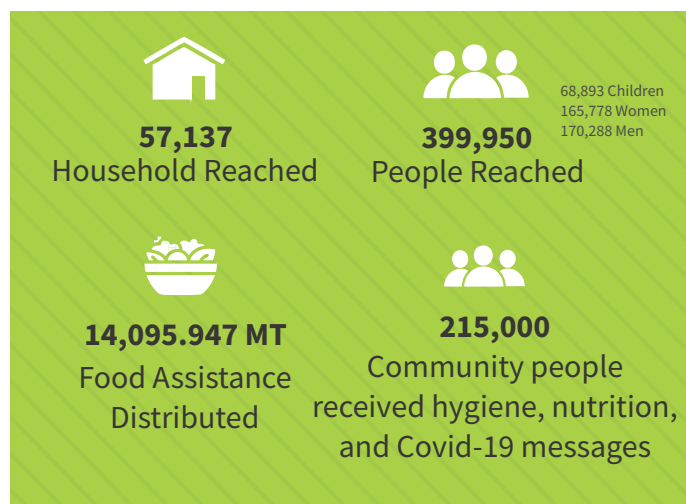


Food Security and Emergency Response

A rapid, extreme deterioration in the humanitarian situation in Afghanistan is observed with more than 22 million people projected to need food assistance in 2022, including more than 8 million people in IPC4 reliant on assistance to mitigate loss of life. Half of Afghan children were at risk of acute malnutrition.

In response to the mentioned situation, FSCWEO with the support of WFP provided nutrition-sensitive, unconditional emergency food assistance to severely vulnerable, food-insecure households, including Pregnant and Lactating women and children 6-59 months in all 11 districts of Farah province and Center of Nimruz Province to prevent further deterioration of their food security and nutritional status and avoid or minimize the needs for targeted households to resort to negative coping strategies during the months of most severe food insecurity.

Key Achievements



(A) SSUP-Food Project – First Phase from January to June, 2022

Under this project, Faradata Social Change and Women Empowerment Organization- FSCWEO provided six months of WFP- unconditional nutrition-sensitive [in-kind] food assistance to 158,522 of beneficiaries, 22,646 HHs on monthly bases.

(B) SSUP-Food Project- Second Phase from July to September, 2022

Under this project, Faradata Social Change and Women Empowerment Organization-FSCWEO provided three months of WFP- unconditional nutrition-sensitive [in-kind] food assistance to 109,270 of beneficiaries, 15,610 most vulnerable households in 11 districts of Farah Province.

© SSUP-Food Project- Third Phase from Oct, 2022 to June, 2023

Under this project, FSCWEO will provide (from Oct, 2022 till June, 2023) 9 months of WFP- unconditional nutrition-sensitive in-kind food assistance to 80,790 of beneficiaries, 11,542 households on monthly bases In five districts of Farah.

(D) CAP-IDP& NDP Emergency Response Project

During the year 2022, 5 Districts in Farah Province (Bakwa, Gulistan, Purchaman, Jowain, and Farah Centre) faced serious food insecurity situation due to a combination of Weather worse conditions, drought, conflicts and increasing costs of living and food. A large number of households displaced or faced with acute food insecurity.

In order to prevent further deterioration of food security, Faradata Social Change and Women Empowerment Organization- FSCWEO under the General Food Distribution: Contingency Response Project provided 2 months of unconditional nutrition-sensitive [in-kind] food assistance to 19,495 of beneficiaries, 2,785 Households affected by the crises.

The assistance distributed to severely vulnerable, food-insecure households in order to avoid or minimize the needs for targeted households to resort to negative coping strategies during the months of most severe food insecurity.

(E) CBT- Cash Based Transfer Modality Project

Under this project, FSCWEO with the support of WFP will provide (from Oct, 2022 till June 2023) 9 months of unconditional nutrition-sensitive, and Cash assistance to 4,554 households (31,878 beneficiaries) in Zaranj District of Nimruz Province on monthly bases.

Leadership, Peace Building, Conflict Resolution, and Advocacy

The Center for Leadership and Youth Empowerment established in January 2021. The center aims at building youth capacity towards establishing long term peace and stability in Afghanistan. Research, capacity building, education and exchange programs are the center's core tools for achieving the above goal.

The primary focus of the Center for leadership and Youth Empowerment is to support youth initiatives through institutionalizing Community-based approaches, and supporting peace through establishing community-led conflict resolution platforms as well as enhancing social cohesion, awareness-raising and economic development for a peaceful and prosper Afghanistan- which deeply highlights the important rolls of the local communities, CSOs and community elders in the successful implementation, effectiveness, and sustainability of the initiatives. That's why the inclusive contribution, and involvement of all sectors of the society is essential and undeniable.




Key Achievements

5 Peace building and conflict resolution community-led platforms have been established in Kang and Zaranj Districts through mobilization and empowering of 35 CSOs, 500 Community Elder, 200 Youths in which 50% of them were women.

675 Community elders, women, youths and community people in which 340 of them are women have been empowered and meaningfully involved in peace building and conflict resolution platforms at district and provincial levels.

Peace building, conflict resolution and social cohesion messages have been conveyed to 101,000 Individual in which 40% of them (40,100) are women through broadcasting 100 radio messages, distributing 20 Public Banners, drawing 20 wall arts, conducting 20 community dialogues, distributing 30 Banners in Mosques, and approaching 30 religious readers to convey peace messages in Fridays' special gathering (Khutbas).

FSCWEO with the support of UNDP-ABADEI Project implemented the Strengthening Peace in Unstable Condition through Community Cohesion, Mutual Acceptance, and Awareness on Peace and conflict Resolution in Nimruz Province. The overall goal of this project was to strengthen the local communities' ability to directly contribute to peace building, conflict resolution, recovery planning, and advocacy in Nimruz province.



Main Activities during 2022

1. Establishing the Provincial Advocacy and Conflict Resolution Network (PAN Network) with the inclusive membership of all active CSOs.
2. Conducting 5 professional workshops for the PAN network.
3. Organizing one Provincial Conference on Peace, Tolerance and Economic Development to narrow down the gaps between the CSOs and Communities through setting together and discussing peace.
4. Establishing District Level Advocacy and Conflict Resolution Circles (DLACs) in each of two targeted districts in Nimruz.
5. Linking the DLACs with the PAN Network in order to facilitate the smooth transition of problems from the district's levels to the provincial tables.
6. Conducting 4 workshops on Peace, and Conflict Resolution (Enhancing Youths' Conflict Management Skills) for 100 youth (men and women) from academic institutions.
7. Conducting 20 Peace, Tolerance and Economic Development Community Dialogues for 500 local people in Nimruz center, and Kang District.
8. Conveying 20 peace-building messages through posters with specific slogans on Peace, Social Cohesion, and transparency. These publications will be distributed to the public places/institutions.
9. Drawing 20 wall Arts conveying Peace, Tolerance, and social participation at public places.
10. Approaching 30 Islamic figures, CDCs' members to convey peace building and social cohesion messages through Mosques (Juma Khutbas).
11. Developing and broadcasting 100 radio messages on peace, social inclusion of local people and conflict resolution through local radios.
12. Organizing two Football Tournament in Zaranj City and Kang District to promote peace-building messages.





Child Protection and Nutrition

Poverty and lack of sustainable jobs in Afghanistan distracted child protection mechanism and driven children to be seen as profit machine for their parents. Child labor, early marriages, force marriages, child abuse, child trafficking and hard working on the streets are the un-wanted examples of child right violation and lack of protection mechanism for children in Afghanistan, specifically in Farah Province.

Evidence shows that the COVID-19 pandemic and the recently full-on development collapse on top of the humanitarian and economic crisis in Afghanistan worsen the situation for children and has likely led to an increase in children developing new mental problems.

Based on Farah DoRR last year's survey estimated that more than 800 returnees' families have

settled in Muhajerabad refugees camp, located in the east part of Farah city, and more than 2,300 IDP families in the 4th area and Bashir Abad Village of Farah Center were situated in the west part of Farah city. Children in these camps are miss-used by their parents and treated to work on the streets. As soon as they turn to 6 years old, they were seen as profit machine on the streets to earn money through shoes polishing, car washing, begging and sometimes committed thieving.

Therefore, the Center for Child Protection is focusing on providing inclusive protection mechanism, sustainable WASH facilities and equal educational opportunities for all children in the western and southern provinces of Afghanistan.

Primary Interventions:

(A) Food Security- Nutrition Food

FSCWEO with the support of WFP and under the SSUP-Food and CBT, and CAP-IDP& NDP Emergency Projects in Farah and Nimruz Provinces provided LNS- Special Nutrition Food for Children under-5 and WSB- Special Nutrition Food for PLW-Pregnant, and Legating women in 11 districts of Farah and Center of Nimruz Provinces.

(B) Child Protection- Child Friendly Spaces

A child-friendly space (CFS) is an environment designed to help children feel safe, calm, and comfortable while they are interacting with practitioners.

Setting up and running Child Friendly Spaces is one of our most important activities in emergencies. As well as providing the food, water and materials to build temporary shelters – the type of work that immediately comes to mind when thinking about a crisis. It's vital that children have a place where they can feel safe, play, and keep hold of their childhood.

FSCWEO aims at supporting children by providing sustainable and inclusive protection mechanism in a friendly way. Therefore, FSCWEO established its first self-funded CFS- Child Friendly Space in Center of Farah Province on Late 2022.

Children will receive a diverse range of educational, and leisure sessions as well as being involved in other FSCWEO's interventions such as free educational, Legal and Psychosocial Counselling Services, Nutrition food, Livelihood Classes, and Unconditional Food Assistance.

Engineering and Rehabilitation

Our Center of Engineering and Rehabilitation (CoER) was established in late 2021 and has brought together the most experienced and educated professionals. Five highly qualified and distinguished specialists who have masters' degrees in civil engineering, water resource Management, and considerable individual experience in construction and shelter restoration are in charge of running the Engineering Center. They have experience of managing similar projects as they have worked on and led project components of flagship programs including ES-NFI, CCNPP, and UNDP-ABADEI.

FSCWEO under the Center of Engineering and Rehabilitation (COER) implemented 2 Quick Impact projects in Nimruz Province with the support of UNDP, and 35 Rehabilitation small projects in 11 Districts of Farah Province with the support of World Food Programme- WFP.

Key Achievements

- Health serviced improved to 13,000 families (91,999 individuals in which 14,560 are children and 7,280 PLW women).
- 800 girls provided with safe, friendly and standard learning environment.
- 39,963 Households, 279,741 local people provided with safe communication roads, and Agricultural water
- 31 Quick impact projects implemented in 11 districts of Farah and 2 Districts of Nimruz Province.
- 234 Villages Covered.

(A) Quick Impact Projects

Two quick impact actions have been identified, prioritized and implemented with the direct involvement and supervision of local people.

- **Provision of Sustainable Electricity System for the Kang BHC Clinic** A 5 KW Solar system has been installed for the Kang BHC Clinic. The clinic is located in the center of Kang district- covering the majority of district's villages. The clinic provides essential health services to more than 13,000 families (91,000 individuals in which 14,560 are children under 5 and 7,280 are PLW women). Due to no access to sustainable electricity, the clinic was faced with severe operation challenges- facing clients with deadly risks. By the installation of current system, the health services have been improved to 91,000 local people and the clinic is able to enhance its operation and provide more essential medical services to the communities.

- **Repairing the Bi Bi Khadija Girls School** Through the repairing of school and construction of PCC and WASH facilities, 800 girls provided with safe and standard learning environment which will highly improve their health and keep them in school. 800 girls are studying in Bi Bi Khadija School locating in the center of Zaranj City. The school was severely damaged and the students were not safe specifically during the cold weather as the majority of windows and doors were destroyed, the WASH facilities were out of service and the school ground was covered by soil which was harmful for the student to play and spend their free time.

The projects have been selected through a comprehensive community needs assessment and conducting numerous meetings with the CDCs, Community elders and local people. The projects have been selected and prioritized among a tremendous number of ideas and problems shared by the local people. On 28 June, 2022, both projects have been handed-over to the sectorial departments.

(B) GFF-Conditional food Assistant- Food for Work

FSCWEO under the WFP-SSUP, and GFD-Conditional Food Project implemented 29 community-based rehabilitation projects in 11 Districts of Farah Province, covering 232 villages, and 39,963 households.

39,963 Households, 279,741 local people provided with safe communication roads, and Agricultural water which will increase the income of local communities and strengthen their linkages with the local markets.
